## **Clos St Laurence...**The pick of the crop...again.

**St Laurence Wine Syndicates for 2025...**What started out as a single winemaker (Michael L.) turned out to be three parties, two small parcels but sufficient and with the bulk (~400Kg) going to Michael's syndicate of 11 members. Peter T's syndicate had a resources clash and was unable to participate however, club members provided a good turn-out and had the crop picked in just a few hours – well done!



The pick was dry and the yield was down and 11 days earlier than last year. The quality better than expected considering the extended and elevated heat conditions plus the lack of rain. This year, some 600+ Kg of fruit was picked and


it was ripe Some vines, not many, had shown some exposure to stunted growth (perhaps from herbicide or other viral attacks). There was evidence of a second pollination late in the season as some rows

displayed underdeveloped bunches of grapes. This year's grapes when compared to last year's crop (of 756Kg) was down nearly 20% in yield.

#### South Australia dominates Top 250 Australian Wines of 2024 An original article published by GRACIE WALLACE

Multi-award-winning wine writer Tyson Stelzer has revealed his <u>Top 250 Australian Wines of 2024</u>, with South Australia dominating the list by winning <u>nine</u> out of 14 categories. The awards came from renowned wine regions across the state including Coonawarra, Clare Valley, Eden Valley, Barossa, and McLaren Vale.

Coonawarra's Penfolds excelled, winning three categories, including <u>Wine of the Year</u> with the Penfolds Bin 180 Coonawarra Cabernet Shiraz 2021.

The judged categories included:

- Wine of the Year
- White Wine of the Year
- Red Wine of the Year
- Sparkling White of the Year
- Sparkling Red of the Year
- Riesling of the Year
- Chardonnay of the Year
- Other White of the Year
- Pinot Noir of the Year
- Grenache of the Year
- Cabernet Sauvignon of the Year
- Cabernet Sauvignon Shiraz of the Year
- Shiraz of the Year
- Dessert & Fortified of the Year

Cabernet Sauvignon of the Year: <u>Wynns Coonawarra Estate John Riddoch Coonawarra Cabernet Sauvignon</u> 2021 (Coonawarra)

Cabernet Sauvignon Shiraz of the Year: Penfolds Bin 180 Coonawarra Cabernet Shiraz 2021 (Coonawarra)

Shiraz of the Year (tied at 98 points): <u>Chapel Hill The Vicar Shiraz 2021</u> (McLaren Vale), <u>Torbreck The Laird</u> 2018 (Barossa Valley) and <u>Henschke Hill of Grace Shiraz Museum Release 2008</u> (Eden Valley) from South Australia (tied with <u>Clonakilla Shiraz Viognier 2023</u>, <u>Mount Pleasant Old Hill 143-Year-Old Vines Hunter Valley Shiraz</u> 2023 and <u>Mount Langi Ghiran Langi Shiraz 2021</u> from interstate)

Speaking on the list, Tyson Stelzer said: "Since I retired as editor of the Halliday Wine Companion in 2022, it has perhaps been the worst-kept secret that I continue to taste Australian wines incessantly. I publish reviews regularly in WBM and Barossa Mag, as I have done continuously now for almost 20 years.

"In response to popular demand, and as an opportunity to give something back to Australian winemakers and wine lovers at this time, it's my great pleasure to share my Top 250 Australian Wines of 2024, free for all to access, share, and reproduce. These represent the finest line-up of Australian wines I have ever tasted."
